### April 2018 Meeting Summary

President Bob Baker started the meeting at 7:42 pm. Forty-one people were in attendance.

There will be another opportunity to buy sodas or candy bars before the presentation starts.

Bob Baker opened the meeting with a call for rail-related news and / or announcements. There were several items:

Tom Hoffmann—The east-bound Amtrak Empire Builder, train #8, either hit a truck, or was hit by a truck, at a grade crossing near Columbus. There was a significant delay.

Charlie Schreiber—Norfolk Southern engines were seen leading trains on the Canadian Pacific (former Milwaukee Road) main line.

At least one train of brand-new hopper cars, an estimated 100-110 of them, led by Norfolk Southern engine(s), were seen headed northwest (toward the frack sand mines?) on the Canadian National (former Soo Line) main line.

Union Pacific is working on a bridge, possibly the one over Oak Creek south of Puetz Road, south of Airport Junction (College Avenue) on their Milwaukee Sub (formerly the Chicago & North Western New Line Sub). The work train is stored at the "brick yard spur" when it is not working.

New or nearly new hopper cars are being seen with CNW (Chicago & North Western) or CMO (CNW subsidiary Chicago, St Paul, Minneapolis & Omaha) reporting marks. (Those names and reporting marks are still owned by Union Pacific. They may be running out of UP numbers in their existing system?)

Keith Schmidt—Amtrak will no longer accept special car and train movements. They will also no longer offer maintenance services to owners of private rail cars. Others said that the Association of Private Rail Car Owners is lobbying for a reversal of that decision. Amtrak makes a profit on that business. Many private rail car owners have significant influence with the US Government.

Jeff Marker—The Talgo train set that ran through the derail protecting an open drawbridge on July 2, 2017, is headed back to Seattle. It required over \$5 million in repairs, which are now completed.

Bob Baker asked if everyone had read the minutes of February 24 Board Meeting (which were printed in the April issue of Sparks & Cinders), and if anyone had any comments or corrections to them. There were no comments or corrections. Tom Hoffmann moved that they be approved as printed. Keith Schmidt raised two points of order: This is not a business meeting, and Board minutes are approved by the Board. The motion was rescinded by Tom Hoffmann.

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The "announcements and discussions" part of the meeting ended at 7:50 pm.

Mike Yuhas took over to introduce Rob McGonigal, the editor of Classic Trains. Rob is originally from the Philadelphia metropolitan area, as is Mike. Rob left in 1982. Mike left in 1989. Rob worked for the South East Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission (SEWRPAC) as a public-contact person. He then joined the Trains magazine editorial staff, becoming one of the editors, and meeting Mike. Rob then became the founding editor of Classic Trains magazine, which began publishing in 2000, and has been its chief editor since then. Rob McGonigal took over at 7:53 pm. Rob began his presentation where his Reading story began, at the Elkins Park commuter station, mile post 9.5 going north from the main Reading Terminal on Market Street in downtown Philadelphia. Elkins Park is south of Jenkintown, where the main line northeast to West Trenton, New Jersey, and ultimately Newark and Jersey City, splits from the line directly north to Bethlehem and other points in Northeastern Pennsylvania. (That is a very simplified picture, as the Reading had other main lines going west and northwest, and lots of branch lines.) Rob lived in Elkins Park from 1964 to 1974 (ages 5 to 15), and had the use of a camera for much of that time. We started with those pictures, and then moved out to many other locations on the Reading system around Philadelphia. We were also treated to a number of older Reading images from the Kalmbach Publishing Company photo

Rob closed his presentation with a visit to interlocking Tower A-2 (Western Avenue) on the near west side of Chicago. This is now a 100% Metra operation. It is where the former Milwaukee Road main line (3 tracks) turns northwest and crosses the Chicago & North Western main (4 tracks) going west toward Oak Park, West Chicago, Geneva, Clinton, Iowa, and Council Bluffs, Iowa. The Milwaukee Road runs over former Pennsylvania track east of Tower A-2 to reach Chicago Union Station.

Rob's presentation ended at 8:48 pm. Questions and answers ran to 8:57 pm.

Bob Baker reminded everybody that we will not meet here in May, but will instead have our annual banquet at Meyer's Restaurant in Greenfield on Saturday, May 5. David Leider will be presenting the history of the Chicago Stock Yards, with emphasis on railroad service. Bob said he had talked to the management about the noise that we had experienced at one previous banquet. Debbie Goerke asked if the members were interested in having pitchers of Pepsi, Diet Pepsi, and Sprite. The consensus was in favor. We are still looking for quality door prizes. We will return to the North Shore Congregational Church on Friday, June 1. Mike Patrick will doing our presentation. Its topic will be announced later.

### IT'S TIME TO TAKE A METRA TRIP

Welcome to the ninth edition of my Metra Trips & More! This year I have added five auto trips that will take you to some of the region's more exciting railfanning locations to drive to. Regardless if you are traveling by auto or Metra, don't leave home without some fellow enthusiasts. Half the fun is being with others!

Metra's Weekend Pass is now \$10 and can be purchased on board the train. It allows you unlimited travel on its weekend system every Saturday and Sunday and Mondays during Memorial and Labor Day holiday weekends. So there's no reason not to take advantage when possible.

All Metra trips are designed to originate on the UP North Line from either Kenosha or Waukegan for each trip and see what interests you. All trips try and include at least a 30 minute lunch period and list a restaurant. If not, purchase food at a food court and eat on the train. Departing Milwaukee by auto from the Marquette Interchange to the Kenosha Metra Station at 5414 13th Avenue is 36 miles and should take about 45 minutes.

Exit at Hwy 158, 58th Street and go east to Sheridan Road and make a right and another right at 54th to the Station. Parking is \$5 a day.

To Waukegan go south on I-94 to US 41 South and continue to Grand Avenue. It is about 46 miles and allow a 'safe' hour. Exit here and go east to the end at Pershing Blvd. Turn right and go down the ramp to the Stop Sign, Clayton Avenue. Turn right and make a U-turn to park along side the south curb. FREE parking. Otherwise it is \$5 a day in public lots. Station is in clear view 1 ½ blocks from car.

Once arriving at Ogilvie Transportation Center, allow the following walking times between stations: To Union Station: 10 minutes, LaSalle or Millennium Stations 25 minutes, between Millennium and LaSalle Stations 20 minutes. The famous Canal Street Crossing, 3 blocks north of Ogilvie takes just 10 minutes. Should you have any questions or comments, call Jeff Marker, 414-906-8883.

Now that you have the rail portion, here is five automobile trips to interesting railroad "Hot Spots." Gather a few friends and head out for a day. Should you have any questions, please call me at 414-906-8883. I might even join you!

First of all, we all like to save money and here's a great way at a few major destinations. If you plan to visit East Troy and subscribe to Trains Magazine, the May issue "Ride This Train" Supplement on page R-21 has a 2-4-1 coupon.

Probably the most popular railroad museum is IRM. Google Groupon: Illinois Railroad Museum and you will find a variety of attractive deals with occasional 20% bonus offers that can bring the \$10-\$14 admission prices to below 2-4-1. While Hesston Steam Museum is free admission except on three-day holiday weekends, its ride tickets can also be purchased at almost half prices on Groupon too. When picking any destination, you can now Google and YouTube them.

Here's trips to consider with easy directions for those of you without GPS guidance systems. Travel times are based on average traffic and not rush hour with Milwaukee departures from the Marquette Interchange. For those going to see Metra or Amtrak lines, it is always best to either have timetables with you or Google them. After all, railfanning is all about timing!

HESSTON STEAM MUSEUM—Saturdays/Sundays, 1201 E. 1000 North Rd., La Porte, IN. 175 miles, 2:40, 11 a.m.-5 p.m. I-94 to US 41 (or 294-Tolls) to 94, to

Michigan Exit #1 M239 South to W1000/Galena Road, 6 miles off I-94.

ILLINOIS RAILROAD MUSEUM – Open Daily, 7000 Olsen Road, Union IL. 88 miles,

95 minutes. Take I-43 south to East Troy exit Hwy 120 south to US 12, to WI 120,

to ILL 47 south to Hwy 43 to N. Union Road to Olsen Road to Museum.

PORTER JUNCTION/CHESTERTON IN – 146 Miles, 2:20, Take I-43 to US 41 (or 294-Tolls), to I-94, Exit 22B (Burns Harbor) follow US20 East and W. Beam St./Cty Rd. 1275 N. Indian Boundary Rd. to Wagner Rd. See tracks. CHESTERTON is 1.2 miles east at Rileys Railhouse B&B, 123 N. 4th Street. More than 100 daily trains each. Porter Jct., 3 crossings within one block. Chesterton is NS Mainline only.

ROCHELLE RAILROAD PARK -- Closed Tuesdays, 124 N. 9th Street. 120 Miles, 1:55. Take I-43 south to I-90, to-I-39, Exit 99. Go west on ILL38 and North on 7th. Look for signs and railroad tracks.



# From the Archives

### May 1958 — 60 Years Ago

DERAILMENT AT ELM GROVE: On April 19 a hotbox on Western Fruit Express No. 9212 caused a 30 plus car derailment with approximately \$500,000 damage to rolling stock, buildings, cargo, etc. It was a rather dismal spectacle. Most mail and passenger trains (eight) ran via the Northern Division (Hartford, Iron Ridge, Horicon, Cambria, etc.) between Milwaukee and Portage. Olympian Hi No. 16 detoured from Portage through Madison and Janesville and a bus was chartered from Portage for its Milwaukee passengers. Freights were run through Savannah. Bunk car X916359, brought in from Tomah Shops, has become the new depot, with use listed as temporary....On May 26 the C&NW and the Wisconsin Public Service Commission will meet to determine the fate of 104 one-man stations which the C&NW is requesting permission to close. There are 196 such stations in Wisconsin; 81 central stations would take the place of those being abandoned....The Milwaukee Road again has the top speed rating in the country for a start to stop run. No. 16, the Olympian Hiawatha, does 61.9 miles, Tomah to Portage, in 45 minutes for an average speed of 82.5 mph.

### May, 1963 — 55 Years Ago

Walt Bubbert reports that the agreement between the Soo Line and the Milwaukee Road regarding the use of the Milwaukee's line Rugby Jct. - Milwaukee is up for renewal soon....From Jim Scribbins: the Milwaukee Road is getting 16 GP30s from EMD per statement by F. A. Upton, Chief Mechanical Officer....The Chapter is planning a fantrip on either September 15 or 22 to the Circus World Museum at Baraboo and the Mid-Continent Museum at North Freedom via the C&NW. We need at least 240 full fares (\$6.90) to make the trip, the museum admissions are extra.

### May, 1968 — 50 Years Ago

Though the Jos. Schlitz Brewing Co. has cancelled the Circus Parade, the Circus Parade Limited will run on June 29, powered by ex-GTW No. 5629....Extensive schedule changes for the C&NW Chicago-Green Bay trains effective May 5 will have the net result of eliminating one of the remaining four round trips between the two cities....MILW trains 9 and 10, the Copper Country Limited, completed their final runs on March 8. MILW trains 117 and 118, the Varsity will operate at least until July 26 in order that hearings may be held relative to their discontinuance

### May, 1973 - 45 Years Ago

The featured speaker at the annual Chapter banquet on May 18 will be industrial designer Brooks Stevens, best known to railfans as the designer of the original Hiawatha streamliner....At about 2:00 p.m. on April 16th, about 250 feet of the roof of the C&NW tunnel at Tunnel City, the only remaining tunnel on the old Madison Division, caved in due to extremely heavy rainfall in the area. There are no plans to reopen the tunnel....The Jos. Schlitz Brewing Co. announced that ex-Southern 2-8-2 No. 4501 would power this year's Circus Parade Limited on June 29....The April rains have wreaked havoc on Milwaukee Road tracks and bridges, including a big washout at 62nd & State, the bridge near Grand Ave., and the westbound main at Calhoun Rd. in Brookfield.

### May, 1978 - 40 Years Ago

The British Columbia Royal Hudson No. 2860 paid a visit to Waukesha on April 21 and 22....The C&NW Sussex depot has been sold, and if everything goes well, the depot will be moved from Maple Ave. to the rear of Henry's Country Store on Main Street....The Kettle Moraine Railway is scheduled to begin the 1978 season on May 27. The schedule will not be finalized until negotiations are completed to operate the line an additional two miles to the east.

### May 1988 - 30 Years Ago

The speaker at the annual Chapter banquet on May 6 will be Ed Burkhardt, president of Wisconsin Central Ltd....The Fox River Valley Railroad startup is scheduled for May 6, but will probably be delayed at least a month....The Soo Line is planning to proceed with the single tracking of the main line along the river from La Crosse to Wabasha this fall. CTC will also be installed. The work should be completed by next summer. Then single tracking will proceed eastward from La Crosse to Duplainville....Kalmbach Publishing Co. is leaving the famous 1027 N. 7th St. address for new facilities in Waukesha County. That famous number will be perpetuated in railroad style as the new street number will be 21027.

### May, 1993 - 25 Years Ago

The Soo Line eastbound passing siding between Calhoun and Brookfield Roads has been removed....Soo Line traffic has increased and even some ex-Milwaukee Road 2000-series locos have been brought out of storage....The WC is also busy and a number of ex-Santa Fe SD45s are on the property....As a result of the WC acquisition of the FRVR, the ex-Soo Line main line in Oshkosh from 20th Ave. to Harrison St. will be sold and the FRVR (ex-CNW) line will be upgraded from 10 mph to 25 mph with the proceeds from the sale. Our man in Oshkosh reports that the elderly C&NW bridge over the Fox River will either be replaced or completely rebuilt.

### May, 1998 — 20 Years Ago

The inaugural run of the Hiawatha Extension service between Milwaukee and Watertown operated on Monday, April 13. The commuter service is intended to reduce traffic on I-94 while reconstruction is in progress. The service will end on July 11....The speaker at the annual Chapter banquet on May 2 will be Bob Nadrowski, Vice President-Mechanical of Wisconsin Central Ltd.

### May, 2003 — 15 Years Ago

The speaker at the annual Chapter banquet on May 3 was Chuck Allen, Superintendent of the Chicago Transportation Coordination Office for Norfolk Southern. He spoke about the intricacies of moving freight through Chicago. He had a very interesting computer simulation showing rail operations in the Chicago area....Wisconsin Chapter members enjoyed a tour and trolley ride on the East Troy Electric Railroad on May 10th.

### May, 2008 — 10 Years Ago

The 2008 Chapter banquet featured Norm Carlson as the speaker. Norm is the Vice-President and Curator of the East Troy Electric Railroad Museum. He gave a Powerpoint presentation celebrating the 100th anniversary of the East Troy Museum.

### May 2012 - 5 Years Ago


